Air Force Academy History



USAFA was established April 1, 1954.

- Airpower leaders, long before the Air Force was a separate service, argued that they needed a school dedicated to war in the air, to train Airmen.
- After September 1947, when the Air Force was established as a separate service, this idea finally had the legitimacy of the new service behind it.
- July 11, 1955, the same year construction on the Academy began in Colorado Springs, the first class of 306 men was sworn-in at a temporary site, Lowry Air Force Base in Denver, Colorado.
- More than 60 years after the first class was admitted, the Academy has graduated more than 54,000 officers.

LEAD Program – Background



USAFA

- 4-year public university in Colorado Springs, CO
- ~4,000 cadets total, ~850/year earn a commission upon graduation

Leaders Encouraging Airman Development (LEAD)


- Authorizes Commanders to nominate highly qualified Airmen to USAFA
- 85 slots awarded annually

Eligibility Requirements

- Must be a US Citizen, Unmarried, no Children, not pregnant
- Cannot be past 23rd birthday by 1 Jul of the year of entry to USAFA
- Cannot be past 22nd birthday by 1 Jul of year of entry to Prep School

LEAD Program – Application



Pre-Candidate Questionnaire (Opens 1 Mar – 31 Dec year prior to entry)

Admissions Statistics



The acceptance rate is very selective at 11%. Total approximate applicants each year is 11,666.

Ranked #7 (2021) on Forbes' Top Public Colleges list.

Class of 2018 breakdown

- 1,206 men and women were inducted into the Academy. 984 cadets were scheduled to graduate. Attrition rate was 209 cadets (18%).
- There were 942 men (78.1%) and 264 women (21.9%) in the class.
- There were 585 (48.5%) cadets who were potentially pilot qualified.
- The average high school GPA of the class was 3.9.
- 142 graduates attended the Air Force Academy Preparatory School.
- 45 graduates were previously enlisted Airmen.
- 417 graduates were scheduled to attend pilot training.
- As of May 30, 2024, 54,883 men and women have commissioned into the USAF, and 485 into the USSF.



Eligibility & Requirements



Academic

• Higher standards are the norm. Recent year groups have averaged in the top 3% of their high school classes. Competitive candidates have a SAT score between 1230-1440, or an ACT score of 29-34.

Character

• The admissions process carefully reviews strength of character and leadership potential. Submission includes a recommendation letter, writing sample, and a personal data record review.

Physical

 Candidate Fitness Assessment – evaluation of the following events; basketball throw, pull-ups, shuttle run, modified sit-ups, push-ups, and a one-mile run.

Medical

Medical examination and/or necessary medical waivers.



Admissions Cycle



March 1 – December 31

 Pre-candidate Questionnaire (PCQ) opens. Admissions application process is iterative. Several steps with numerous actions to complete during the open window.

July 15 – January 15

 Upon completion of PCQ, pre-candidate receives correspondence and guidance from USAFA for the duration of the application process.

January – College Admissions Test (ACT & SAT) must be taken by this time for results to arrive at the Admissions office.

- **February-April** Applications are reviewed, and majority of appointments are offered during this time.
- June U.S. Air Force Academy class enters.



Frequently Asked Questions



Who can apply to USAFA? And how?

• Applicants must be at least 17 but not past their 23rd birthday by July 1st of the year they enter the Academy. Be a U.S. citizen. Be unmarried with no dependents. Be of good moral character.

What is the commitment after graduation?

 Depends on your AFSC. Non-rated jobs, 5-years. Rated jobs, 10years.

What is a typical day for a cadet?

• A cadet's day starts early, by 0630 with morning formation, with academic classes in the morning and afternoon, noon-meal formation, and marching to lunch with their squadrons. Athletic practices, clubs, military training, and intramurals fill the afternoon until dinner. The day ends with taps at 2300 with dorm inspection, after many hours of studying and preparing for the next day.



Frequently Asked Questions



How does USAFA differ from a traditional college?

• USAFA provides a world class education, while also developing cadets through military, athletic, and character outcomes. An Academy education is valued at more than \$416,000, no financial cost to the cadet or their family.

What is the USAFA Preparatory "Prep" School?

• The Prep School prepares *cadet candidates* in academics, athletics, character development, and military training to succeed at the Academy. Cadet candidates are not guaranteed an appointment to the Academy. The Prep School is a rigorous 10-month program.

Do all graduates go on to be pilots?

 No, cadets must volunteer and be medically qualified to try and become an Air Force pilot. The majority of each graduating class chooses to go to pilot training after graduation.

Reserve Officers' Training Corps (ROTC)



ROTC is a demanding extracurricular activity on top of full-time school

- Marketed as "only 4-6 hours a week"... so much more.
- Leadership Lab 2 hours, once a week; PT 1 hour, twice a week; ROTC class 1 hour, twice a week
- Crosstown vs non-crosstown

Split between first two years (General Military Course, GMC) and last two years (Professional Officer Course, POC)

- GMC = Acclimation to military culture and lifestyle, competing for Enrollment Allocation (EA) to Field Training
- POC = Develop as a leader, supervise/guide GMC cadets, prepare for job selection and commissioning

Generally, 3- or 4-year program, sometimes 2-year programs are offered

- 3-year cadets are known as "250s" combining 1st and 2nd years classes
 - Prior Es, with proof of prior service, are waived out of 1st year classes

Field Training – 3 week-long BMT-esque training at Maxwell AFB, AL


- BMT vs Field Training... Different purposes
- Field Training is required before becoming a POC cadet
- Different majors = different chances to get EA
 - 1. STEM majors
 - 2. Strategic Language majors



- First and foremost: Full-time college student
- Core ROTC Events
 - Leadership Laboratory: 2 hours a week
 - PT: 1 hour, twice a week
 - Aerospace Studies class: 1 hour, twice a week

Other parts of ROTC

- Side projects: Planning/executing training events; supervising cadets
 - Huge lift to balance
- Special Events: Dining Out, Field Days, etc.
- Extracurricular clubs: Arnold Air Society, Honor Guard, Spec Ops Prep Club
- Lower- and upper-classmen
 - General Military Course (GMC)
 - 1st Year: Intro to Air Force
 - 2nd Year: Field Training Preparation (Probably the hardest year)
 - Professional Officer Course (POC)
 - 3rd Year: Lower-level command (Taking care of cadets, tactical execution)
 - 4th Year: Higher-level command (Strategic vision, delegation most insightful year)



UNCLASSIFIED ROTC Avenue 1 - ASCP



Traditionally three avenues for enlisted to pursue ROTC...

- Airman Scholarship and Commissioning Program (ASCP)
 - Offers AD enlisted personnel opportunity to earn a commission who can complete all undergraduate and commissioning requirements in 3-4 years; selection board held once a year (January) and utilizes "whole person" concept to evaluate applicants
 - Application submission timeline: 1 Sep-15 Oct; waiver requests must be included in application; late packages not accepted
 - Those selected will separate, join an AFROTC detachment, and become a full-time student. USAF provides up to \$18k in tuition/fees scholarship, annual textbook allowance, and monthly nontaxable stipend – commission 4 years AD, 4 years IRR
 - Must have 12+ hours of graded college coursework with at least 3.0 GPA
 - ACT composite score of 22, SAT combined Reading/Math score of 1100, AFOQT score of 39 (Applicants with 24+ college credits do not need to submit Act/SAT but must meet min AFOQT scores)
 - Not authorized for a second bachelor's or master's degree

Traditionally three avenues for enlisted to pursue ROTC... (cont'd)

- Scholarships for Outstanding Airmen to ROTC (SOAR)
 - Virtually the same requirements and stipulations as ASCP
 - SOAR is a "commander's program to select top-flight enlisted members for commissioning" – selections are made at the MAJCOM level for most Airmen; those assigned to FOAs and DRUs are selected from a Small Units selection board
 - Boards utilize "whole person" concept; applicants evaluated on ability to put their package together in the proper format IAW ECP Package Checklist
 - Applications with waivers included are due 1 Sep-15 Oct
 - Selection board meets once in a year (January)

ROTC Avenue 3 – POC-ERP



- Professional Officer Course-Early Release Program (POC-ERP)
 - POC-ERP offers AD enlisted personnel the opportunity to earn a commission who can complete all bachelor degree and commissioning requirements in 2 years; selection board held once a year (March) and utilizes a "whole person" concept
 - Application submission timeline: 3 February; waiver requests must be included in application; late packages are not accepted
 - Completed packages need to be emailed to the following org box: afrotc.rrue@us.af.mil

NOTE: You have the whole year to submit your package.

- Board typically focuses on academic performance, CC recommendation, and airman's duty performance history
- Those selected separate from active duty, join an AFROTC detachment and become a full-time student. USAF provides a monthly nontaxable stipend. Upon graduation and completion of ROTC, commission with a 4-year AD, 4-year IRR commitment
- Not authorized for a second bachelor's or master's degree; applicants within one year of completing their bachelor's degree additionally may not participate



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

ROTC Avenue 4 – GI Bill

The "Fourth" Way – Get out and go to ROTC

- Use your GI Bill and/or compete for a scholarship
 - Generally, the GI Bill seems to be better than an AFROTC scholarship
- ACT/SAT scores required if under 24 college credits, AFOQT required always
- Getting accepted to ROTC is relatively easy so long as you don't have a criminal record and not dishonorably discharged... but you need to be accepted by your university
 - You need to be accepted by your university, accepted by the ROTC cadre at your university, and enrolled in classes by the start of the school year – generally Fall Semester (August-September)
- More flexibility for your degree
 - Double major for your Bachelor's, finish your undergraduate and go on to do entire or part of your graduate degree
- No need for CC recommendation or preparing a package
- My experience this is the most common way Prior Es commission through ROTC





- Be humble. Cadet life will be alienating as a person who has experienced the real Air Force. Do not let your experience get to your head.
 - This is an opportunity for you to influence/guide future officers from the start
 - The quality of non-prior cadets will surprise you both in good and bad ways
- Persevere. I have seen many Prior E cadets drop out. The other side is worth it if your heart is in the right place.
- Keep an open mind. Being an officer is different than being enlisted; you have many transferable skills and you have gone through a lot to get to where you are at now. The transition is a learning experience, let it happen.
- Balance. Enjoy the experience of being a cadet *and* being a student as much as you can.
